## HELP IN SUFFERING ANIMAL SHELTER

As a new member of the Working for Animals Committee, I would like to share with you my experience at the Help in Suffering Shelter in Jaipur, in 2005/6, which has ultimately led me to serving on these two committees.

I had been given a book called 'Chicken Soup for the Cat & Dog Lovers' Soul', a compilation of short stories dedicated to companion animals. I recognised the name of one of the contributors, Christine Townend, as the founder of Animal Liberation in Australia, so wanted immediately to read her story.

Unknown to me, at that time, it had been under Christine's guidance, over many years, that Help in Suffering had established itself as one of the leading animal shelters in India, and her story took place there. It was entitled Silky's Test. It was a very moving story of Christine's personal experience with a sick, cruelly treated, and close to death, Labrador, who had been dumped at the gates of the Shelter. With help from HIS staff and Christine's own care, love and faith, Silky miraculously recovered, and lived on to become her devoted companion and guard, for some years.

I researched the Help in Suffering Shelter and, with the hope that I might be accepted as a volunteer at such a wonderful and inspiring place, I contacted Christine. I had no actual vet nurse experience, but had been a wildlife rescuer and carer for many years, which I hoped would stand me in good stead. To cut a long story short, I arrived at the shelter, for a six months' stay, one day in November 2005.

The shelter is situated on almost two acres of pretty, tree-studded land called Maharani Farm, in a town called Durgapura, about 8 kms from the city of Jaipur.

I was delighted to discover, when I arrived, that there were many permanent companion animals on site, including several dogs, some cats, a few donkeys, a cow, a horse, a buffalo - and a camel, rescued from a circus. There were around 25 staff at that time, many of whom lived on site as, I am happy to say, did I. Within a week I was delighted to have my own rescued kitten, who I called Tiger, and my own orphaned puppy, who I called Winnie, which Christine passed to me to personally care for.

I very soon came to learn the everyday workings of the shelter. A busy clinic for companion animals took place in the mornings. Three mobile clinic teams – equine, camel and elephant – would go out early in the mornings, to various sites in the city, with their own specialist vet and assistants, to treat animals whose owners could not get to the shelter.

Busy Animal Birth Control and rabies vaccination programs were in continual operation, treating the street dogs, which were rounded up daily, mainly in the early mornings, when they were still sleepy!

Since my visit, all those years ago, I have been more than happy to support KAS and DAS to continue with their invaluable and life-saving work and, now, I am honoured to serve on their committee. Any support you may also feel able to contribute would be very much appreciated. Thank you.

# Kalimpong Animal Shelter

Skin issues are common in dogs this summer season. Lots of ticks and fleas swarm these dogs, making life extremely unpleasant! Summer is also the season when there is plenty of maggot cases in dogs. The total number of clinical cases seen in March was 513.



The Animal Birth Control Programme continues every week as usual where both owner's pets and street dogs are spayed and neutered. Many phone calls come in between for spaying and on a priority basis and owners of pet animals book their appointments. Sixty dogs and eight cats passed the ABC Programme in March.

## Fight for Life

The co-founder of Animals Australia and Animal Liberation is urging the Albanese government to keep its promise to end the live export of sheep.

Christine Townend felt herself being hoisted in the air, suddenly dizzy, and hauled down the gangplank then landing roughly on the dock.

She picked herself up and continued the protest. In the 1970's Christine and her fellow animal rights activists initiated Australia's first protests against the export of live sheep in Adelaide.

"My biggest regret is not seeing an end to this cruel trade," said Christine Townend OAM.

While live sheep exports have fallen in recent years to 575,000, from two million in 2017, sheep are still suffering in horrendous conditions, including heat stress and starvation, on long voyages to the middle east.

After promising to end the trade before the election, Prime Minister Anthony Albanese has alarmed animal rights groups by ruling out a ban in this term.

"I am concerned that if the government loses the next election the prospects of a live sheep exports ban will recede further into the distance, that the northern summer ban itself may be at risk and all the time the sheep will continue to suffer most dreadfully and inhumanely," Christine said.

Courage will be required to face the onslaught of opposition to the proposed ban.

The Federal Government has appointed an Independent Panel to manage the phase out of live sheep exports. They are due to report in September.
